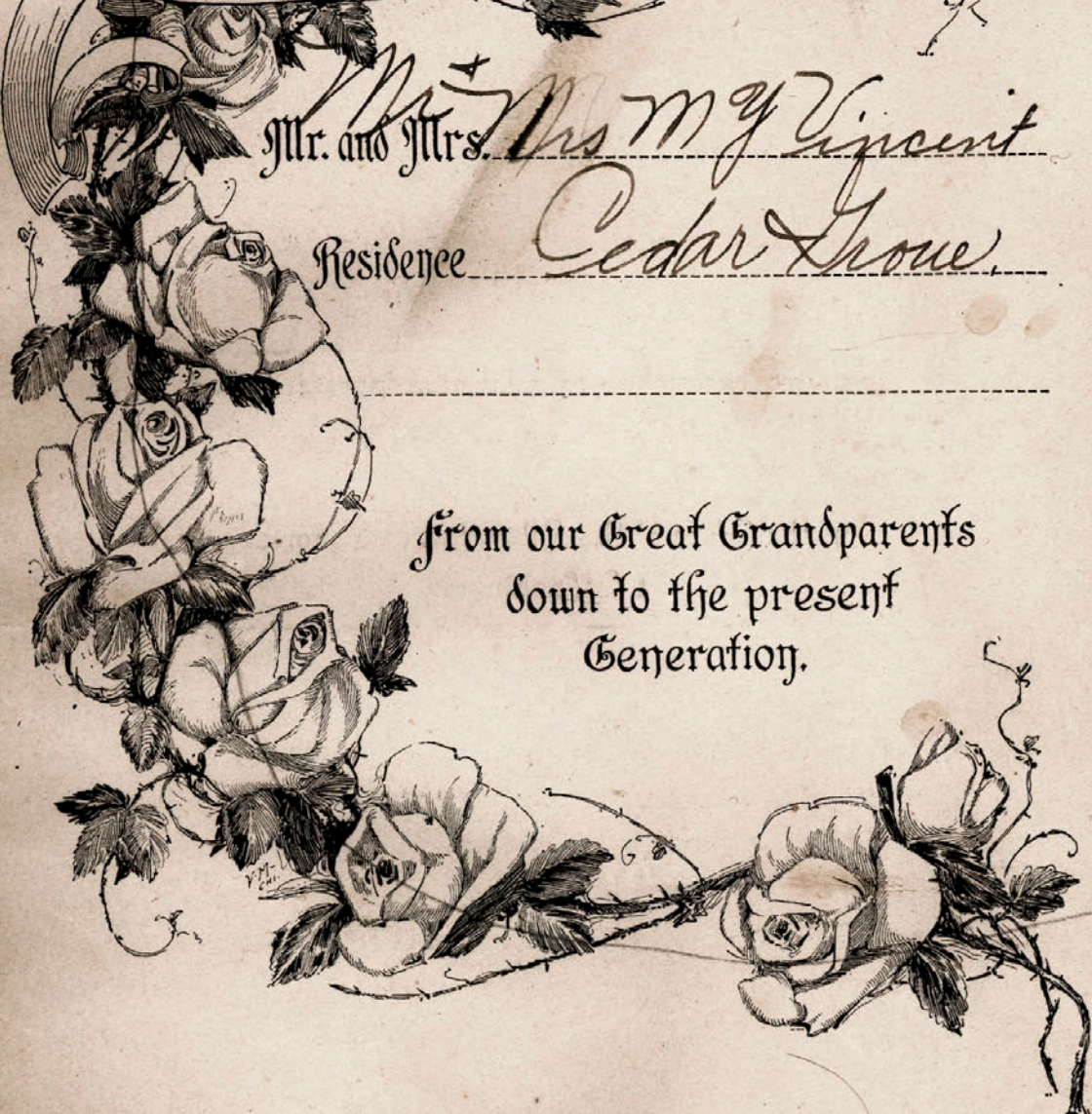

## Prefatory Note.

Marriage is sacred and of divine origin. The family, the church and the state, are the three institutions God has ordained for the happiness and government of man-kind, and all of these are dependent upon the sacredness of the home.

The most important decision of life, with the single exception of the personal yielding of the heart to God, is the decision and choice made in marriage, and such vows should only be taken in the fear of God and in harmony with the teachings of His Word.

Deep, pure, unselfish love should prompt every marriage, and nothing less than this can justify any person in marrying at all; for such a step concerns not only those who take it, but in all probability, the happiness and destiny of untold numbers of immortal souls.

Whatever tends to increase the general recognition of the sacredness of the home and family life, is of inestimable value. All see the necessity of a legal record being kept of every marriage, and that such a record is necessary to preserve the purity of the home; but few realize the importance of keeping a family history. In this respect, we come far short of being as wise or as faithful as God's ancient people, the Jews, whose family history was so carefully preserved. For their faithfulness in this respect, they were many times rewarded, both temporally and spiritually, and were enabled to secure their family inheritance.

Generally speaking, the births, marriages and deaths of the immediate family, are recorded somewhere, perhaps in the family Bible, but in one or two generations this is lost sight of, and many fail to make even such a record. Because of this neglect, the great majority of the American people know very little of their ancestors, and so fail to honor and reverence their memory. Thus families become widely scattered, and in one or two generations all feeling of kinship is lost and natural affection

is considered of little moment. How different is all this from the plain teaching of the Scriptures!

We are convinced that this general neglect is the outgrowth of carelessness, rather than of intentional wrong, and has been largely the result of the lack of a complete and well arranged blank form, in which a family record could be easily kept.

This work, we believe, will supply a pressing demand, and result in great good in the increase of natural affection, and the strengthening of family ties. We earnestly pray that the living, whose names are herein recorded, may, by the grace of God, make the record such as will prove a blessing to their families, their relatives, their friends, and the race.

## Suggestions and Instructions.

We think this work so plain and complete that little need be said under this heading but we call brief attention to a few points that might otherwise be overlooked. Of course so important a Record as this should be filled out neatly and accurately and with ink that will keep bright and clear for generations to come.

*Marriage Certificate.* Whenever possible have this filled out by the clergyman who officiated and signed by witnesses present at the marriage. When this is not possible, it can be filled out by some other person and the names of two who were present recorded as witnesses.

*Guests.* Many will prefer to have names of guests written by the guests themselves thus making this part of the Record an autograph souvenir of the wedding occasion.

*Our Ancestry.* Make every possible effort to secure full information in filling out pages under this head. This will in many cases involve much difficulty and painstaking which will only prove the more the need of such a work as this in every home. One such Family Record as this carefully filled out and preserved will make it not only possible but easy for descendants to make out a full and complete record in their turn. Under the head "Husband's Ancestry, Paternal," fill out the first two pages for the husband's father's grandparents on his father's side and the second two pages for the husband's father's grandparents on his mother's side. So under the heading "Husband's Ancestry, Maternal," the first two pages should be filled out for the husband's mother's grandparents on her father's side and the second two pages for the husband's mother's grandparents on her mother's side. The same order should be observed in filling

out corresponding pages of "Wife's Ancestry" Paternal and Maternal.

**History.** In writing out personal and family history let the work be done with great care and, if need be, written and rewritten and carefully condensed before copying in the Record, so that important facts may not be omitted and space used for less important things.

**Infancy and Babyhood.** Under this heading many items of interest might be suggested including weight at birth, color of eyes and hair, for whom named, age when baby began to walk and talk, first words, baby sayings, records of special or serious illness. etc.

**Children's Sayings and Doings.** This will include items of interest from the time of babyhood to maturity.

**Autographs and Addresses.** We suggest that the value of this part of the Record may be increased by having children write their own names as soon as able to do so and once each year afterward during their school-days, thus preserving an interesting record of their gradual progress.

**Funeral Services and Obituaries.** This may with care be made an especially valuable part of the Family Record. In almost every case a brief condensed sketch of the funeral sermon can be easily secured from the clergyman who had charge, and the words of songs rendered from those who led in that part of the service, and these may prove a great source of comfort in after days.

**Special Legacies.** This is not designed for wills but for a record of special family heir-looms and keepsakes that may be handed down from one generation to another.
